TECHNOLOGY ENHANCES OUR ABILITY TO COMMUNICATE AND SERVE FAMILIES



Due to the generosity of several donors, Brighton Center now has a new way to communicate with customers in more than 120 languages and dialects through the use of an Instant Language Assistance (ILA) device. The ILA allows any two people to have a real-time, natural back-and-forth conversation easily and instantly, no matter what language or method they use to communicate. This greatly enhances our ability to meet customer needs and reduces obstacles in helping families achieve self-sufficiency. **“Staff have already had amazing success using the technology to help customers feel welcome, comfortable, and safe while also building relationships without a language barrier. We have also seen how critical this tool is to helping families connect with services,”** said Eric Owsley, Community Resource Center Director.

NEW CREDENTIAL LAUNCHED TO SUPPORT REGIONAL WELL-BEING SYSTEM

Building Community Well-Being launched the Well-Being Credential in March. The credential focuses on enhancing individuals' knowledge of well-being, primary and secondary prevention, and the pivotal role service providers play in the primary prevention system. The credential is open to providers, customers, stakeholders, and anyone in the community. The goal is for the whole region to engage in creating a Family Well-Being system that focuses on primary prevention, increases civic engagement, and elevates our mission, vision, and values. 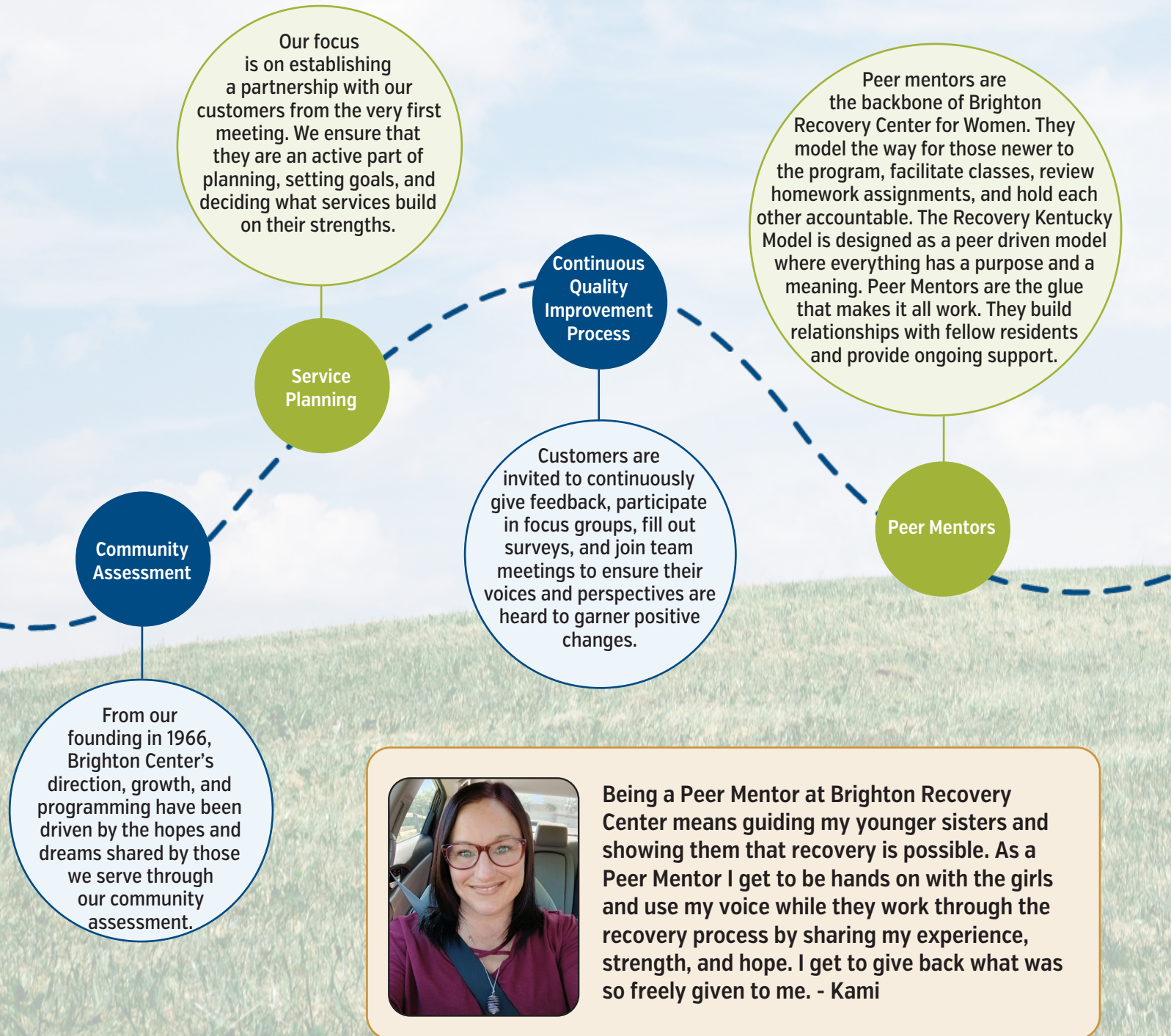

LISTENING TO OUR CUSTOMERS

The Ambassador Program at Center For Employment Training (CET) is a leadership opportunity for individuals who are dedicated to serving and representing CET. Ambassadors hold a daily check-in meeting with new trainees, act as mentors to new and current trainees, provide campus tours, and help staff plan events and outings.



As an Ambassador, I am the face of Center for Employment Training (CET), representing CET and leading the other trainees with integrity. I am able to be more involved with the other CET Trainees and use my voice to implement ideas. This experience

Several Brighton Center programs include Resident Councils that meet regularly to discuss workshop topic ideas, programming needs, current trends, challenges, and opportunities for improvements and growth. This results in residents actively having a voice in what happens where they live.

PAIGE'S JOURNEY

From the moment I joined Youth Leadership Development (YLD) in fifth grade, it felt like stepping into a new world. At first, it was just something my friends talked me into, promising fun. Little did I know it would become a place where I found friends and a second family.

I vividly remember those early days, sitting with my facilitator and pouring my heart out about everything under the sun. It felt liberating to have someone listen without judgment, to feel understood and valued. That's what YLD became for me, a safe space where I could be myself, where I could laugh, learn, and grow.

As the years rolled by, so did the challenges. High school brought its own whirlwind of activities, including soccer, cheer, band, and Future Business Leaders of America (FBLA). Balancing academics, sports, and YLD became a juggling act, but I was determined to make it work. There were times when it felt overwhelming, especially with my struggles with depression and anxiety, but YLD was always there and a constant support amidst the chaos.

One of the highlights of my time at YLD was Magnified Giving. I loved learning about different nonprofits. Giving back to the community became a passion, a way for me to make a tangible difference in the lives of others. It wasn't just about volunteering; it was about understanding the world beyond myself and finding fulfillment in helping those in need.

COVID-19 brought its own set of challenges, but YLD adapted, continuing to be a beacon of stability in uncertain times. The familiar faces and activities provided a sense of normalcy when everything else seemed up in the air. It was during these moments that I realized the true value of community and connection, something YLD had nurtured in me from the beginning.

I'm grateful for the friendships and the memories I made. YLD helped me come out of my shell, become more outgoing, and embrace leadership opportunities I never thought possible. When the time came to think about college, YLD had prepared me well. Thanks to their support and encouragement, I earned a full scholarship to Thomas More University, where I plan to study criminal justice, a passion sparked by my love for crime TV shows.

As I prepare to embark on this new chapter, I carry with me the lessons learned from YLD: resilience, compassion, and the importance of giving back. I know the road ahead won't be easy, but I feel ready! I am ready to continue making a difference, advocating for mental health, and embracing whatever comes my way.

YLD isn't just a program; it's been a lifeline, a place where I found my voice, my purpose, and a community that believes in me. As I step forward into the future, I know that YLD will always be a part of who I am, a testament to the power of youth programs and the transformative impact they can have on young lives.

TENISHA'S JOURNEY

Before my involvement with Brighton Center, I was in an unpredictable, unstable, and uncomfortable place in my life. I lived in Atlanta, GA, and worked for the United States Postal Service. Though Atlanta is quite the place to reside, and I had a good place to work, it did not fit my lifestyle as a single parent. I would work 12-14 hour shifts 6-7 days a week to maintain my expenses. It became hard for me to find child care, which began to cause stress and uncertainty in my life.

I knew I had to break that cycle. I decided to return home, where I thought I would have help getting on my feet. Things became more difficult because I did not have a place to stay for the first few months back. Moving from house to house was so uncomfortable for my daughter and me, and at that point, I knew I had to do better.

Once I finally began to settle into an apartment, I went to apply for benefits and in that process, I stumbled upon a flyer for Brighton Center's Center for Employment Training. I was immediately interested because I was not working, and I had already planned to use that time to go back to school. I saw on the flyer that it was debt-free education, and the different programs they had to offer. I attended an information session and immediately enrolled. Settling into the program, I got to know my Instructor, who was very welcoming and involved with each trainee, ensuring that any concerns or obstacles that may occur during the time in training were addressed.

After a few months, I completed a significant amount of the curriculum but ended up in a situation where I no longer had my car, leaving me without transportation. I began missing many days because I did not know how I would get back and forth. I knew I did not want to give up because I was so close to the end. I managed to get to know the bus route in my area. I walked over a mile to and from my bus stop daily. This was my biggest challenge, and sometimes it crossed my mind to give up, but there was something in me that just wanted to keep going and see it through.

My Instructor began to see a decline in my attendance and asked me how she could help. I explained my issues, and she introduced me to different programs and resources to help me with transportation. I also met with a Financial Wellness Coach who guided me through resources, including budgeting and an Individual



Development Account to save money for a reliable car. I was connected to the Samaritan Car Care Clinic, where I was able to purchase a car. This gave me the confidence to finish the program and go through the job search phase because my biggest concern was how I would get to a job. I now work full-time at the Internal Revenue Service [IRS].

Being involved with Brighton Center took my strength and confidence to another level. Being around good leaders makes you want to become a good leader. I also learned that talking about the challenges I was experiencing resulted in getting connected to the help I needed. I was impressed by the amount of care the Instructors and Coaches poured into each trainee, giving them a reason to want to complete the program. Being at Brighton Center gave me the knowledge and resources I needed to be successful, and I am forever thankful.

My best memory is being at the front desk and seeing these bright faces filled with optimism and courage come in daily, ready to build their career. I am happy for them because I know they made the right decision to enroll at Center for Employment Training. If I can give them one message, it would be not to let life obstacles stop them from completing the program. **SPEAK UP AND KEEP GOING** because a great reward is coming.

Every Child Succeeds provides in-home parenting education and support for new moms, dads, and babies. Home Visitors meet with families weekly and focus on healthy pregnancy outcomes, optimizing child development, and growing strong families. Through hands-on activities, curriculum discussion, family/child groups, and a strength-based approach, families can increase the emotional bond between parent and child, build parental confidence, and enhance family self-sufficiency.

children and their families graduated from **Home Instruction for Parents of Preschool Youngsters**

Home Instruction for Parents of Preschool Youngsters (HIPPY) provides home visitation services for families with children ages 2-5 that focus on helping parents prepare their preschool children for success in school. HIPPY is a developmentally appropriate early literacy curriculum designed to promote children's cognitive, social, emotional, and physical development. The curriculum helps parents as their child's first and most important teacher through a set of easy-to-use educational activity packets and storybooks.

At both **Bright Days** and **Early Scholars Child Development Centers**, children receive individualized classroom instruction to prepare them for success in school. The Centers utilize developmentally appropriate, research-based curriculum, high standards of health and safety practices, highly qualified staff, and provide an enriching learning and physical environment with nutritious meals, learning through play, and parent involvement activities.

individuals completed a skill division at **Center for Employment Training**

Center for Employment Training (CET) offers adults life-changing skills that help them find good jobs with a livable wage and build a successful future. Instruction is hands-on, practical, and personal, designed to get people working as quickly as possible. CET is accredited by the Council on Occupational Education and provides competency-based skill-specific training that prepares trainees for occupations that are in demand in the local labor market.

individuals completed **Trades To Success**, our 3-week pre-apprenticeship program

Trades To Success is a 3 week Pre-Apprenticeship program for individuals with a focused interest in creating a pathway to a career they'll love. In the 3 weeks, trainees explore in-demand trade and apprenticeship careers in Greater Cincinnati/NKY. Participants earn the Lean 6 Sigma Yellow Belt Certification, and Kentucky Essential Skills Certification. Trades to Success has a high focus on connecting individuals to Trade programs and apprenticeships, while providing added support to their journey.

women successfully completed **Brighton Recovery Center for Women** (9-12 month program)

Brighton Recovery Center For Women (BRC) is a 100-bed facility located in Boone County that utilizes Recovery Dynamics curriculum and is a peer-driven model of recovery. The program helps women recover from chronic substance use disorder and addiction, and move toward a life of sobriety and productivity. BRC takes a long-term, holistic approach to recovery that is comprised of four distinct modules of progression, and is ultimately connected to an array of Brighton Center services.

CELEBRATING 100+ DEGREES & CERTIFICATIONS

June 11, 2024 was declared “Northern Kentucky Scholar House Day” by Newport Mayor Tom Guidugli, Jr. as Brighton Center and Neighborhood Foundations celebrated the 100th degree or certificate earned by residents of Northern Kentucky Scholar House.

Northern Kentucky Scholar House began in the fall of 2015 as an innovative collaboration between Brighton Center and Neighborhood Foundations to offer housing and child care support to single parents pursuing post-secondary degrees or certifications.

Northern Kentucky Scholar House combines housing and a quality STAR-rated child development center on one site, allowing parents to pursue education and, ultimately, employment. This two-generation approach towards family success encourages each to thrive so that they can reinforce the other’s success.

By developing the child’s education at the same time as the parent’s, we are seeing benefits that are sustainable across generations. The degrees obtained to date include nursing certifications, bachelor’s degrees, and master’s degrees, all of which lead to quality employment and long-term self-sufficiency. We are thrilled to celebrate all of the residents of Northern Kentucky Scholar House who have worked so hard to achieve their hopes and dreams. Thank you to our educational partners: Northern Kentucky University, Gateway Community & Technical College, and Cincinnati State.

- monitoring child development during the first 36 months



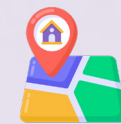
